LIVE SAINTS

It was in Vacation Bible School when I was about to introduce the topic of saints and sainthood with the children gathered in church. I must say that I never quite learn not to ask youngsters questions because "you never know what you'll get." So, anyway, I popped the question to one of the students in the front row, "Are you a saint?" "No he responded, I'm not dead yet..."

In Christ we have been "set apart," made holy saints. For He has redeemed us on the cross; and in Baptism we have risen with Him. So, as we learn in Ephesians, "We have been seated with Him in heaven".

Ran across an interesting Facebook entry from Pope Frances on the subject of "sainthood." He referencing a popular that those who lead worship and wear vestments (perhaps thinking they are holier than others) when he wrote:

"We need saints without cassocks, without veils – we need saints with jeans and tennis shoes. We need saints that go to movies that listen to music that hang out with their friends. We need saints that place God in first place ahead of succeeding in any career. We need saints that look for time to pray every day and who know how to be in love with purity, chastity and all good things. We need saints – saints for the 21st century with a spirituality appropriate to our new time. We need saints that have a commitment to helping the poor and to make the needed social change. We need saints to live in the world, to sanctify the world and to not e afraid of living in the world by their presence in it. We need saints that drink Coca-Cola, that eat hotdogs, that surf the internet and that listen to their iPods. We need saints that love the Eucharist, that are not afraid or embarrassed to eat a pizza or drink a beer with their friends. We need saints who love the movies, dance, sports, theater. We need saints that are open sociable normal happy companions. We need saints who are in this world and who know how to enjoy the best in this world without being callous or mundane. We need Saints."




Summer is quickly coming to an end and soon the **choir** will be singing for you again on Sundays. I

As of July 2, 2019 we have received \$92,069.13, towards the goal of raising \$150,000.00 for Outreach Kentucky. As soon as we have the \$150,000.00 in the bank we will move forward with calling a missionary to develop this mission in Richmond, Kentucky.





Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. (Rm 1:7)

So far I've been doing very well in class. I scored a 97% on the first exam. Even though I did well it was obvious to me and a few others that it was not enough and that we need to help out the ones who did not do so well on the exam. We saw it as a "first lesson" in pastoral care. There was also another memorable moment in class when Dr. Nordling berated us for trying to make the Greek fit what we think it should be in English. He was adamant that we need to make the English fit what the Greek says. This kind of conviction from him gives me confidence in the faithful translations we have in English today. We just completed our second exam. The class as a whole did much better than on the first. I managed to get a 93% on this one.

Learning Greek is definitely a challenge. The best way I can describe it is by comparing it to false-summits in mountain climbing. You start up the mountain and think you see the top. Then when you get going up that last little bit you see another spot just a little bit higher. So you climb on only to find out that was yet another false-summit. At this point you're tired and your body hurts. The high altitude means (for my near sea level Midwestern lungs) that you're out of breath. But you didn't come this far to give up. So you press on. You might do this over 5 or 6 false-summits until you get to the real top. Greek is like that. Everyday is a new false-summit. The class is intense at one chapter a day from the textbook. You do learn the entire language to the point where you can compose sentences. And even though you're not at the top yet, you can still look back down and see just how far you've come!

I've been encouraged to go to as many different churches in the area over the summer. The goal of this is to get an idea for a church of the 35 or so in the area that may suit me for field work come fall. I've managed to get to 9 services so far; sometimes going to an 8 AM service at one church and a 10:30 at another. One I've been to is Redeemer where Pr. Peterson is. They had an Ordination of a recent graduate. It was something I had never experienced. Redeemer is very traditional. If you like a fast organist go there. You won't have a chance to breathe. Ironically two of my favorites so far are both named Emmanuel. I've also gone to a Bible study with a group that is doing urban ministry in the Fort Wayne area; especially to those who are poor and homeless.

Campus was pretty quiet over the 4^{th} of July (except for all the neighbors setting off their fireworks). Dr. Nordling did have cookout for us and the international students. I manned the grill and had a great time cooking up brats and burgers for everyone. We found out that one of my classmates, Peter, is quite the juggler, having 9 balls in the air! On a later day in class another classmate, Paul, gave Dr. Nordling the "top rated chalkboard eraser in Japan". He wrote "o Nop δ καλος" on it which means "Nord the Noble."

The library has the Chemnitz Library Initiative. They sell books (at the price of \$0.50 for a paperback or \$1.00 for a hard back) that were donated and are duplicates of



what they have or are taken out of circulation. The money goes to help build libraries at all the international seminaries of the church. It's great for students like me because we get to build our own libraries on the cheap. It's also great to know that the money is going to help those abroad learn and teach the Word. Between the library and the books in the co-op I've added some 60 books to my library already beyond the current class's texts. Some of my favorite finds include a couple synopsis of the four Gospels; one in Greek and one in English, a chronological Bible, 3 of the 4 volumes of Pieper's *Christian Dogmatics* (need to find volume 4), a translation of the Dead Sea Scrolls and lots of Luther!

I've been praying for the call process to go well at Emmanuel. In fact our whole class prayed that it would go well after I heard that a call was extended to Pr. Rusert. We started a habit of praying as a class before the professor would get there. Often one or more of the students would have particular requests to be included in the prayer for the day.

I'm keeping all of you in my prayers. May God bless each of you in all you do. Please keep me and my brothers in Christ in your prayers.
