Dear Beloved Saints of Emmanuel,

After meeting March 30th our church council has decided to postpone the resumption of public services at Emmanuel until May 3rd, due to the pandemic virus affecting our nation and world. If our government would lift the "stay at home" safeguard before that day we would resume public Sunday worship sooner. Continue to pray that our Father would deliver us from this evil of body.

Last Sunday, the 5th Sunday in Lent was called "Judica" and its propers are taken from Psalm 43. Many of us can identify with the Psalmist self reflection during the present isolation to protect family and friends from the COVID-19 virus. As your pastor my soul is "cast down" not being able to gather and feed the "lambs and sheep" of Christ's flock here in Tell City. As Christians our souls are "cast down" as we cannot gather together as a congregation in our church building to hear Christ's living Word declaring us in our baptism to be the "beloved of the Lord;" forgiving us of "all our sins;" uniting us in the common confession of The Faith; teaching us to pray; and strengthening us with Christ's living body and blood - "given and shed for you, for the forgiveness of your sins." Our souls are "cast down" as we and our children miss seeing their friends in social gathers. Our souls are "cast down" as our places of employment are shuttered. Our souls are "cast down" as the stuff of everyday living we took for granted a month ago seem to be in short supply. Our souls are "cast down" as we hear dire predictions of how this pandemic might play out in our nation and our world. Our souls are "cast down" as we fear another month of isolation.

Our souls are "disquieted within" us. We are uneasy. Life isn't "normal" anymore. We are "disquieted" life isn't in our control. We are "disquieted" tired of hearing the news of the spread of this virus and its effects on our economy. We are "disquieted" as staying at home with our families may lead to disagreements, frustration, and fighting. We are "disquieted" as we fear drives us to doubt God's good and gracious care for us through the authority He places over us in Church, State, and our homes.

This forced "fasting" in Lent to protect our neighbor from the COVID-19 virus has exposed the false idols in our lives that cannot comfort or calm our souls. Psalm 42 and 43 are written to be prayed together. The 42nd Psalm begins, "Psalm 42:1-3 *As the deer pants for the water brooks, So pants my soul for You, O God. (2) My soul thirsts for God, for the living God. When shall I come and appear before*

God? (3) *My tears have been my food day and night, While they continually say to me, "Where is your God?"*. The Psalmist was exiled and unable to go the "House of the Lord" - the Temple in Jerusalem. He longs to enter the Lord's House, hear His Word, and feast upon the sacrifice for his sins. COVID-19 has exiled us into our homes and we desire to enter the Lord's House to hear His Word and be fed upon His Sacrifice for our sins. The devil, the world, and our flesh cry out, "Where is your God?"

"Hope in God" - He is here! Listen: *Matthew 1:23 "BEHOLD, THE VIRGIN SHALL BE WITH CHILD, AND BEAR A SON, AND THEY SHALL CALL HIS NAME IMMANUEL," which is translated, "God with us."* Jesus is the eternally begotten Son of God, born as our Brother into our skin by the power of the Holy Spirit through the womb of the Virgin Mary. He is Immanuel - "God with us!" After redeeming and winning us from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil with His holy precious blood and innocent suffering and death. He seals the triumph of His cross and the victory of His resurrection to us in Holy Baptism. He promises, *"and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."* This promise cannot be broken - it is washed upon you in Holy Baptism and reiterated in His Word taught. It is fed you in what He has commanded - that we feast upon His body and blood - the only sacrifice for our sins.

Our Lord Jesus is here with us. He is with you in your homes as you gather for daily family devotions. His promise is clear, *"Matthew 18:20 "For where two or three are gathered together in My name, I am there in the midst of them."* For a time, to protect our neighbor, we forgo gathering together as a congregation - but no one can stop gathering the congregation of your household - around Christ's living Word. *"Come, Lord Jesus"* isn't just a quick meal time prayer - it is inviting Jesus to your table to receive His gifts and to allow Him to nourish our faith with His Word. Then we can cast all our "disquietness" and "downcastness" upon our Heavenly Father in prayer as we hope in God. He is the help of our countenance - the Life of the world. He is our God - our Jesus, who is the same, yesterday, today and forever.

We pray with the Psalmist: *"Psalm 43:3-4 "Oh, send out Your light and Your truth! Let them lead me; Let them bring me to Your holy hill And to Your tabernacle. (4) Then I will go to the altar of God, To God my exceeding joy; And on the harp I will praise You, O God, my God."* Strengthen your family with Christ's Word in your homes and soon we shall again meet at the "altar of God" and feast on the sacrifice for our sins.

What About Easter?

In the first century Christians celebrated every Sunday as the 8th day of creation - Easter - the first day of the "new creation." As St. Luke records, *Act 2:42 "And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in prayers."* And again, *Act 20:7 "Now on the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul, ready to depart the next day, spoke to them and continued his message until midnight."* The Church gathered every Sunday with their risen and ever present Lord Jesus in their midst through His Word - "the Apostles' doctrine" taught by which the Holy Spirit brought and preserved them in the "One True Faith" knitting them together in "fellowship." Every Sunday they "broke bread" (St. Luke's term for the Lord's Supper) that they might be fed and sustained by Jesus' living flesh and blood. They also continued in "the prayers" the liturgy of the church. So when we gather again we will celebrate the Lord's Supper for Jesus IS OUR EMMANUEL - He is really here with us in His Word and gifts of baptism, absolution, and the Lord's Supper.

May we thank God for the many varied talents He has given our member to care for, edify, and build up the body of Christ in our Emmanuel congregation.

What About my Spiritual needs?

As a congregation we are concerned about sustaining you with Christ's Word and sacraments in these trying times. During April we will follow the government's guidelines of not meeting in groups of more than 10 people at a time to limit the spread of this virus. We will webcast our Sunday and Holy Week services via "facebook livestream" at their regular times. An order of service will be posted for you to download and participate with us in your homes. We will also post an audio of the service to our website: "www.tellcitylutheran.org" within 30 minutes after our service - for you to listen to and follow along with the order of service within your homes. Pastor Rusert will pray Matins (or a morning prayer service) at 9a.m. daily in our sanctuary Monday through Friday, and Vespers (or an evening prayer service) at 3p.m Monday through Thursday. These services will all be spoken or sung A capella (without musical accompaniment). If you are in need of private absolution and or the Lord's Supper contact Pastor to make arrangements. He is willing to hold family services for family groups of nine or less as per CDC guidelines during the suspension of our regular Sunday services. Don't forget that you can listen to "The Lutheran Hour" Sunday mornings at 7:30a.m. on WGBF - 1280AM and watch "Worship Anew" on DirectTV Channel 377 at 10:30a.m.. They are also available on-line at "www.lhm.org" and "worshipanew.org."

If you are in need of hymnals to conduct daily family devotions in your homes we do have some "Lutheran Worship" hymnals or our older "The Lutheran Hymnal" hymnals for our church family to take home and keep. In both hymnals you will find the order of Matins and Vespers, plus daily Scripture and Psalm readings for your household. They will be available for anyone to pick up on the table near pastor's study Monday through Thursday from 8a.m. to 2p.m.. If you are unable to come to the church building, please contact Pastor or one of our elders and we would be willing to deliver it to your home. We will have devotional materials also available by the hymnals for your taking.

In addition, if you desire to take time to pray in the sanctuary during this crisis, the door nearest our parking lot will be open during the normal hours that pastor is here. We just ask that you respect the recommended social distancing and use good hand washing hygiene. If you or someone in your household is sick please respect your neighbor by staying home.

HOW DO I CONDUCT DAILY FAMILY DEVOTIONS?

All Lutheran families used to practice a daily "Family Altar." Sadly in the business of our lives many fathers and mothers neglected feeding the baptismal faith of their children in their homes. Now the Lord Jesus is blessing us with family time together to reestablish this practice in our homes. If you have a "Portals of Prayer" you will find an "Order of Family" worship in the front of each booklet. (April - June issue is available at the church - stop by and pick yours up or call we will make arrangements to get you the new issue.) Dust off the hymnal you received for confirmation - even if is older - it will have orders for daily prayer, hymns to sing, daily Scripture and Psalm readings, and prayers. The Lutheran Service Book also can be purchased from Concordia Publishing House (www.cph.org) in an e-book format so you can read it on your Kindle, phone, or other device. I would also recommend CPH's app : "PrayNow" for \$8.99 you will be equipped to join the church in the daily lectionary, prayers, and readings throughout the Church year. Also, as Pastor wrote in the COVID-19 letter: "Take a break from all the noise of the news and use this time to grow in God's Word and in your prayers during these days. One of the greatest devotional resources that we have as Lutherans is "The Small Catechism" pray it daily. Dr. Luther said that he never finished learning and praying it. A good practice is to pray, by reading them out loud and meditating on: the "Ten Commandments and their explanation" and read the "*Table of Duties(TOD)*" "*To bishops, pastors, and preachers*" "*What the Hearers Owe Their Pastors*" on Monday. Tuesday - pray "The Apostle's Creed & explanation" & TOD - "*Of Civil Government*"; "*Of Citizens.*" Wednesday - pray "The Lord's Prayer & explanation" & TOD - "*To Husbands*"; "*To Wives.*" Thursday - pray "*The Sacrament of Holy Baptism*" & TOD - "*To Parents*"; "*To Children.*" Friday - pray "*Confession & The Office of the Keys*" & TOD - "*To Workers of All Kinds*"; "*To Employers and Supervisors.*" Saturday - pray "*The Sacrament of the Altar*" & TOD "*To Youth*"; "*To Widows*"; "*To Everyone*;" and "*Christian Questions with their Answers.*"

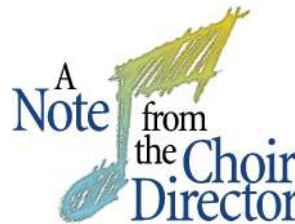

And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age. (Matthew 28:20)

These are certainly strange times. Since my last correspondence with you the routine of life has so drastically changed that uncertainty is more than a physics theory or principle to joke about, but has become vivid like never before. In Hebrew class Dr Tietz told us to set in roots; just as Jeremiah warned the people leaving for exile, we need to be ready for a long haul. *“Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD. He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit.” (Jeremiah 17:7-8)*

My winter quarter ended with lots of excitement. I led my first main chapel service the second to last day of class. I was very nervous but was told I did well. Dr. Maier was preacher and had an excellent sermon on Jonah. I ended the quarter with a 3.85 GPA. I even got an A+ in Homiletics! With the quarter drawing to an end my class had a pizza party the last day. I also brought some of Emmanuel’s famous soup which they loved. I had a good time with my classmates and their families.

Also in that time I was able to spend some time with a friend’s grandfather whom I knew that was near death. The old man before he went into a procedure had asked to be baptized and was by the hospital chaplain. After this I had learned that he was in the hospital in Fort Wayne and went to pray with him and his family. I found out he had passed as I was headed into lead chapel. With the help of Pastor May at St. Johns in Rochester, IN I was able to preach the homily for the family. Truthfully the man bore witness to the Gospel, he knew his need to be saved in Christ. With the texts of Mark 4:26-29 (parable of the seed growing and the man knows not how) and Acts 8:26-39 (Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch) I preached my first sermon. Three days later I preached a second for midweek service at Emmanuel, Tell City; using “Father, forgive them for the know not what they do.” as the text.

While on campus many of us spend most of our unstructured time in the library. It is a great place to study and work through materials. Some of us are there until last call most nights. It’s quite a reversal from where I heard last call in college... And on weekends we’re usually waiting at the door for them to open. We do have some fun while we are there. Some of the study rooms with large windows oppose each other across an open area. We pass notes to each other on the white boards, often just writing book, chapter and verse and have lively conversations with other rooms.

Aside from the humorous there are often serious conversations that happen in the library as well; concerns about the Church, issues we see with the secular world, issues with other church bodies and the people exposed to them, especially those that claim to be Christian but are far from. These are healthy debates, we love and respect each other and have to admit that there are no easy solutions to any of these issues.

Sadly most of this is now been stifled at least for the short term. With this global pandemic all face to face activities of the seminary have ceased. My classes are online, either prerecorded lectures, live interactive video meetings, or a combination of both. Classes online are by no means ideal. Limited professor interaction and loss of student to student interaction hurts the process. Currently most of my books are still in Fort Wayne for my spring classes. I am working to remedy that and get them. I’m not a fan of this electronic studying but will weather the storm knowing these troubles are petty compared to the real issues causing this disruption. I am currently still in Tell City. I am with my family and we are helping each other out to survive this.

This is certainly a time for us all to stand firm in our vocations as Christians. Not only with the challenge of this disease itself but also the panic, hysteria, hoarding, and denial and dismissal that the world is expressing in the wake of this, we can as Christians show our faith in God and hope of the resurrection and to love God and our neighbor. With the apparent state of so many that are inwardly bent and care not for their neighbor we can step up and show the world that Christ cares for them through our own actions.

For us studying, is this a true time of pastoral formation when all is online? Well I think our student president, Jonah Domenichelli, said it well, “We are being prepared to proclaim Christ and Him crucified to the world around us even when all hope seems lost.” We all will be back in class soon enough, in God’s time. And in the midst of this we see a deep new form of what pastoral care really is.

I pray for all of you, especially now. I trust in the Lord through all of this. His will be done. And I rejoice in the assurance of the resurrection!

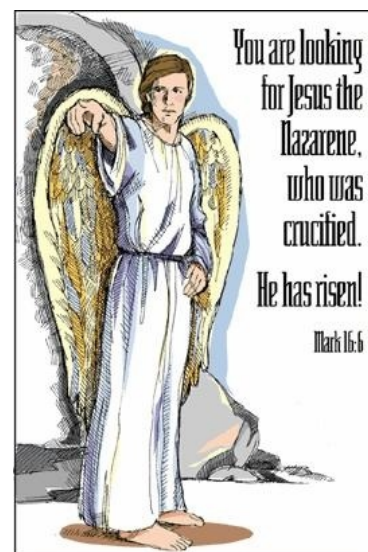

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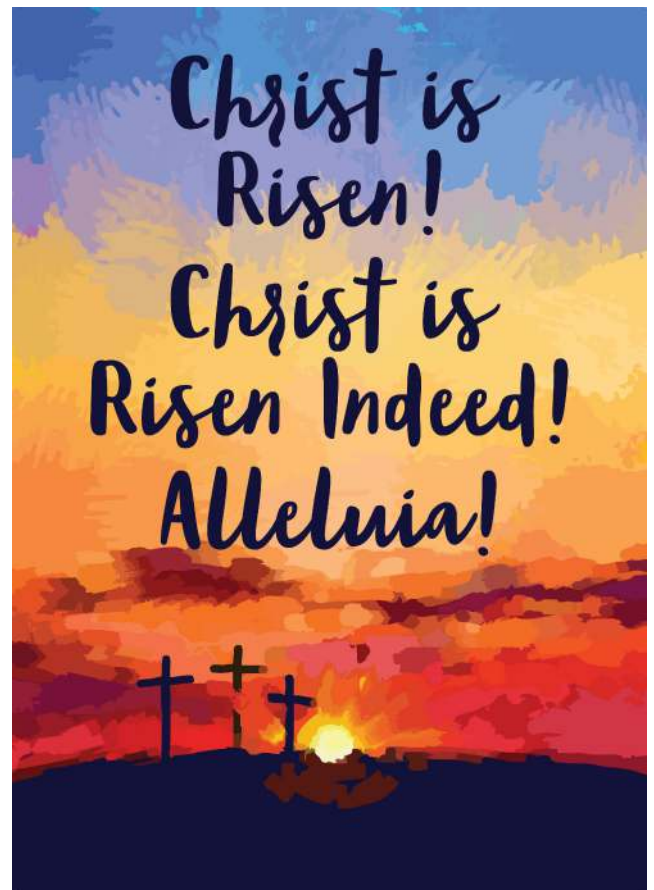
